

Music Development Plan: The Lowry Academy

This summary sets out how The Lowry Academy delivers high-quality music provision in line with the **National Plan for Music Education**, the **MISST (Music Instrumental Specialist Support Team) programme**, and **United Learning’s trust-wide vision for Music**.

Music at The Lowry Academy is inclusive, ambitious and knowledge-rich. All pupils are entitled to sustained musical learning that builds technical skill, cultural understanding and personal confidence.

MISST provision is introduced in **Year 7 (2025–26)**, extended to **Years 7–8 (2026–27)** and fully embedded across **Years 7–9 (2027–28)**.

Curriculum Intent

In line with **United Learning’s curriculum principles**, the intent of music education at The Lowry Academy is that:

- **Every pupil is a musician**, regardless of background or prior experience
- Pupils gain **secure musical knowledge** that enables confident performance and creative expression
- Music contributes to pupils’ **cultural capital**, discipline and sense of belonging

- Instrumental learning is an **entitlement**, not an enrichment opportunity for the few

The curriculum is deliberately designed to ensure that pupils **know more, remember more and can do more in music over time**.

Curriculum Implementation

Curriculum structure and time allocation

- All pupils in **Key Stage 3** receive a **minimum of one hour of timetabled music per week** across the school year.
- Music is compulsory in **Years 7–9**, ensuring continuity and equity of access.
- The curriculum is **carefully sequenced and knowledge-rich**, informed by the **Model Music Curriculum (DfE, 2021)** and United Learning guidance.

Pupils are taught to:

- Read and write staff notation fluently
- Sing and perform accurately, confidently and expressively
- Listen critically to a broad and diverse musical canon
- Understand how music is constructed across styles and traditions

MISST provision

MISST forms the **instrumental spine** of the KS3 curriculum:

- **2025–26**: Whole-class MISST instrumental tuition introduced in **Year 7**
- **2026–27**: MISST extended into **Year 8**, enabling sustained technical development
- **2027–28**: MISST embedded across **Years 7–9**, delivering a coherent three-year instrumental pathway

MISST lessons are integrated within curriculum time and taught by specialist teachers, ensuring high expectations, consistent pedagogy and musical rigour.

Singing and ensemble learning

- Singing is a **non-negotiable** feature of KS3 music
- Pupils sing regularly in lessons and performances
- Ensemble performance is used systematically to develop listening, accuracy, teamwork and resilience

Inclusion and SEND

Music is fully inclusive:

- Lessons are adapted through scaffolding, modelling and differentiated outcomes
- Practical music-making ensures multiple points of access for success
- Instruments and approaches are adapted where necessary

No pupil is withdrawn from music due to SEND, behaviour or disadvantage.

KS4 progression

- Pupils may opt to study **GCSE Music** at Key Stage 4
- KS3 curriculum and MISST provision are explicitly designed to prepare pupils for GCSE demands
- Pupils are supported in working towards **graded instrumental and vocal examinations** where appropriate

Co-curricular Implementation

- One-to-one and small-group instrumental tuition is provided by visiting specialists from MAPAS (Music and Performing Arts Salford)
- Instruments offered include keyboard, guitar, strings, woodwind, brass, drums and voice (subject to availability)
- **Financial support and remission** are available for pupil premium pupils

Ensembles

- Whole-school choir
- KS3 MISST ensembles
- Band and small-group performance opportunities

Co-curricular provision reinforces curriculum learning and supports progression.

Musical Experiences and Wider Impact

- Regular singing in shared events
- Opportunities to perform both informally and formally – through the MISST Play Days and Together Days.

These experiences strengthen pupils' confidence, aspiration and engagement with school life.

Curriculum Impact

As a result of this provision, especially our implementation of the MISST programme, our aim is that:

- Pupils leave KS3 able to **perform confidently**, both individually and in ensembles
- Pupils demonstrate secure **musical literacy** and listening skills
- Disadvantaged pupils participate and achieve at the same rate as their peers
- Uptake of **GCSE Music** is sustained and supported by strong KS3 foundations
- Pupils value music as part of their personal and cultural development

Impact is evaluated through performance outcomes, curriculum assessment, pupil voice, participation data and progression into KS4 and external opportunities.

Planned Development

- Full three-year MISST implementation across KS3 by 2028.
- Expansion of KS3 ensemble pathways linked to MISST instruments
- Stronger internal and trust-wide performance opportunities
- Continued removal of barriers to access and participation

This ensures ongoing alignment with **United Learning's ambition for excellence and equity**, and meets Ofsted expectations for a well-sequenced, inclusive and ambitious curriculum.
