## Subject: English

## Year 7



OVERVIEW	The purpose of our English curriculum is to provide students with both the skills and the knowledge to access and interact successfully with the world around them. A high-quality English education allows students to become confident in expressing themselves as speakers, writers and interpreters of our information dense world. In English at Year 7, we welcome students to a world of words and exciting stories. Most importantly, in Year 7 students are introduced to our four core themes of power, class, gender and social justice.		
AUTUMN	<ul> <li>Component 1 (Prose Wolves of Willoughby Chase) Students will read a full text and will begin to study the theme of gender, one of the key themes that they will then track through KS3 and 4.</li> <li>Writing: The focus for the first half-term is 'Adventure Writing', for which pupils will look at effective planning and implicit characterisation.</li> <li>Component 2 (Prose Wolves of Willoughby Chase) Students will continue with their study of Wolves of Willoughby Chase and will develop their understanding of the book in relation to the theme of gender. Writing: The focus will be on transactional writing.</li> </ul>	Assessment Big Write: Wolves of Willoughby Chase. Pupils will analyse a section of the text linked to the core themes of gender and power. Big Write: Wolves of Willoughby Chase. SPRING	<ul> <li>Component 3 (War and Conflict Poetry)</li> <li>Students will be introduced to poetry through an anthology linked to the theme of war and conflict. Pupils will be considering the poets' messages and how they are delivered.</li> <li>Component 4 (Non-fiction War and Conflict: The Diary of Anne Frank)</li> <li>Students will deepen their understanding of the themes of war and conflict through an anthology of non-fiction articles. Alongside this, students will read and analyse The Diary of Anne Frank. Writing:</li> <li>Pupils will build on their transactional writing skills by studying how to create an effective speech.</li> </ul>	Assessment Mid-year Assessments: Students will be assessed on their skills and knowledge so far to review their understanding. This will consist of a reading question based on Wolves of Willoughby Chase and a piece of narrative writing. Big Write: War and Conflict Poetry. Pupils will analyse a poem linked to the core themes of social justice and gender.	Personal Development The war and conflict elements, both the poetry and non-fiction allow pupils to understand the experiences of soldiers as well as the consequences of war. Through 'The Diary of Anne Frank' we look at the persecution and its consequences.
SUMMER	<ul> <li>Component 5 (Shakespeare: A Midsummer Night's Dream)</li> <li>Students will be introduced to Shakespeare and will learn about the full play by focusing on a combination of plot summaries and focused key moments. Through this text, pupils will begin to learn to interpret Shakespearean language and build on the theme of gender.</li> <li>Component 6 (Prose The Girl of Ink &amp; Stars)</li> <li>Students will read the full text and will learn about how the writer uses language and structure to convey their narrative. Writing: Pupils will build on their narrative writing skills through adventure writing.</li> </ul>	Assessment Big Write: A Midsummer Night's Dream. Pupils will analyse a section of the play linked to the core theme of gender. Big Write: Girl of Ink and Stars. Pupils will analyse a section of the text linked to the core themes of gender power.	Personal Development Through A Midsummer Night's Dream, we consider gender and how much or little gender inequality has changed. Through The Girl of Ink and Stars text, pupils will consider colonialism and the treatment of indigenous peoples.
